Dear Friends,

Many changes have taken place throughout 2015 at David & Margaret Youth and Family Services. We continue to expand services and programs, especially those for transitional age youth (TAY) – young people in foster care who are ‘aging out’ of the system and are facing the challenges of life on their own.

Construction of the Cedar Springs Apartment Village and Youth Workforce Training Center continue apace, and will greatly reshape how we address the needs of this vulnerable population. Without safe, affordable housing and a place to build work skills, TAY often find themselves without resources and on the streets – or worse. Next year, we will open the apartment complex, which will feature supportive services to the residents of its 36 apartments – 25 for TAY, 10 for families, and one for an on-site building manager. Our retail store and café that will provide internships and other opportunities for them to prepare for their life ahead, is scheduled to be open in 2017.

As we further expand and transition, we remain committed to the vision of the pioneers of David & Margaret, who saw those in need and made great plans to help care for them, sharing their hope during their own difficult times.

We believe as has been eloquently stated by Neal A. Maxwell, *“Genuine hope is urgently needed in order for us to be more loving even as the love of many in the world waxes cold; ... more courteous and patient in a coarsening and curt world; and more full of hope, even when other men’s hearts fail them.”*

We appreciate all of you who share that vision and have been so supportive of our mission. Together, we can prepare the children and youth in our care to become fulfilled, constructive members of our community.

# RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM



We currently operate four Residential cottages for female youth ages 11-19. These include Turner, our recovery cottage, which houses our state-certified substance abuse program; Tarr, our emancipation cottage, which houses our youth ages 16-18 who are preparing to transition from the foster care system and into independent life into the community; and Wynn, which houses our Children’s Residential Intensive Services (ChRIS) program clients. Our cottages are the heart of the home-like environment we have strived to provide to our residents over the years.

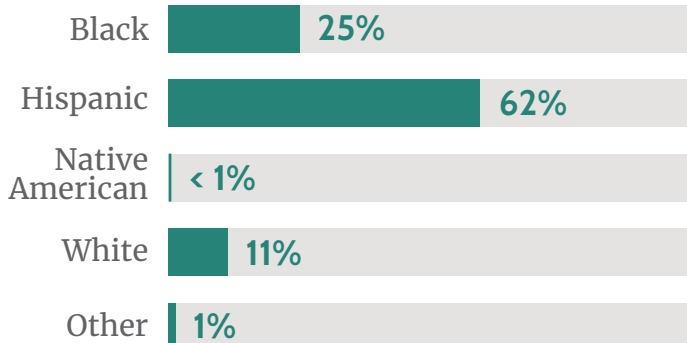

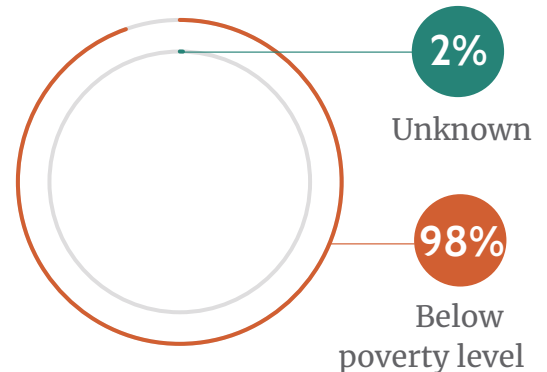

# SHELTER CARE PROGRAM

This 10-bed, 30-day emergency shelter provides temporary sanctuary for girls ages 11-19 who have been taken into protective custody or who are dependent children of the court awaiting placement in a safe environment. The program aims to provide crisis stabilization in a temporary, safe, and caring shelter with a concerted attempt to minimize the mental and emotional trauma experienced by each youth. We also provide a treatment oriented setting where emphasis is placed on providing children with a supportive therapeutic milieu in which the trauma experienced as a result of having been abused, neglected, abandoned, or runaway from and/or detained from a previous placement is immediately addressed.

# MENTORING PROGRAM



Our Mentoring Program is designed to match clients and residents at David & Margaret with suitable and responsible adult mentors. We run a highly structured program including initial and ongoing training for mentors and supervision of the mentor matches. The mentoring match is relationship-based, and focuses on the development and growth of the relationship instead of focusing on academics or other activities.

# JOAN MACY SCHOOL



Joan Macy School is a specialized, non-public school for at-risk adolescent girls our Residential Program as well as community students in grades 1-12 referred by local school districts. It is certified by the California Department of Education to provide special education, behavior intervention, counseling, and guidance. We also provide language and speech development in accordance with each student's individualized educational plan. Our students may have been identified as displaying emotionally difficulties, having a learning disability, or displaying maladaptive behavior. Many have anxiety, hyperactivity, impulse control disorders, an array of emotional difficulties, auditory and visual processing delays and behavior disorders.

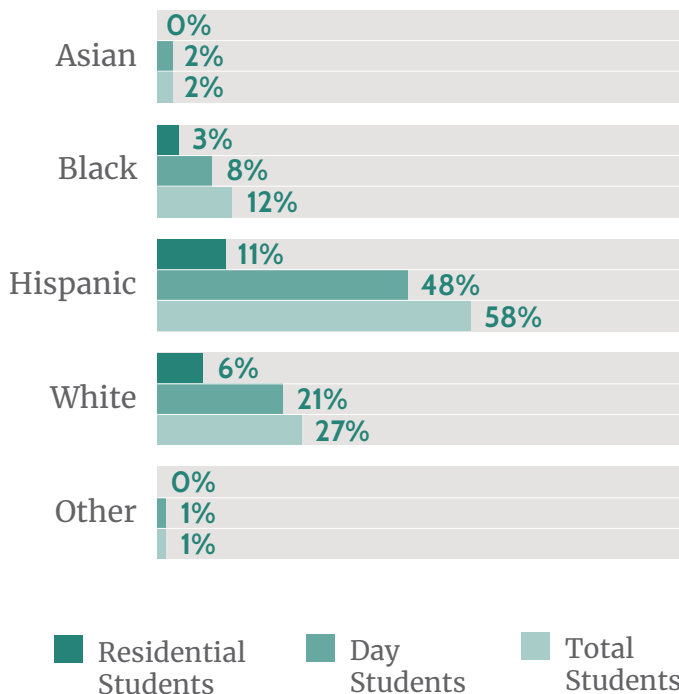

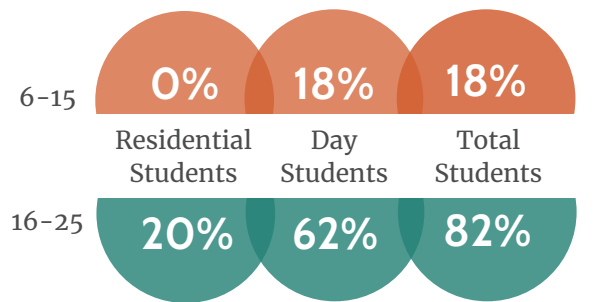

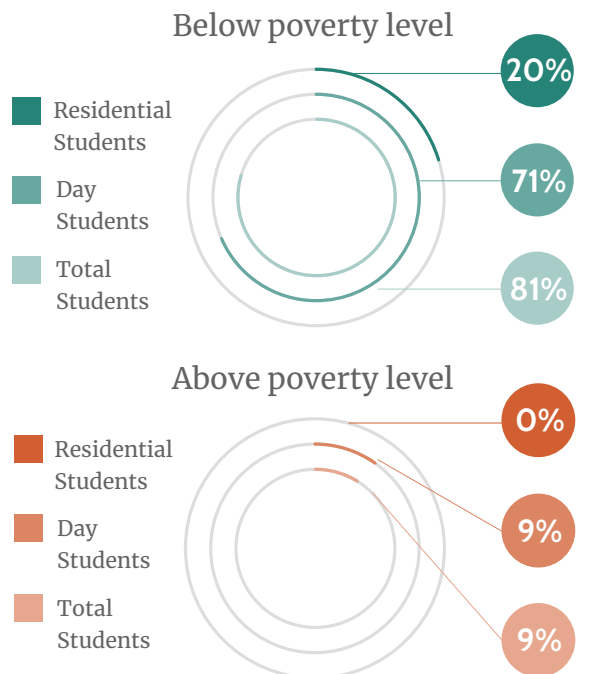

# MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES PROGRAM



David & Margaret has a contract with the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health to provide outpatient mental health services to full-scope Medi-Cal eligible youths up to age 21. The program is able to provide the following services to meet a child/youth's individualized treatment needs. Our Mental Health Services Act (MHSA/Prop. 63) Full-Service Partnership Program is an intensive services program for clients ages 0-15 and includes, but is not limited to, 24/7 crisis intervention, possible services for caregivers, and flexible funds, which can be used to provide services and/or needed supplies for the caregiver and/or youth. The program also has the capability to provide services to non-Medi-Cal eligible youth.

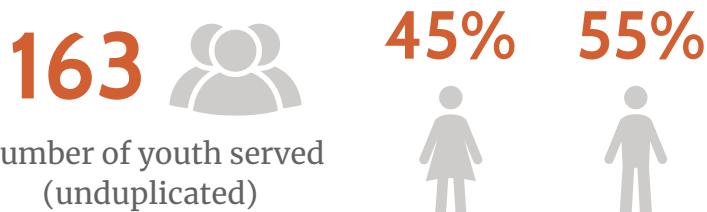


# FOSTER FAMILY AND ADOPTION SERVICES (FFA)

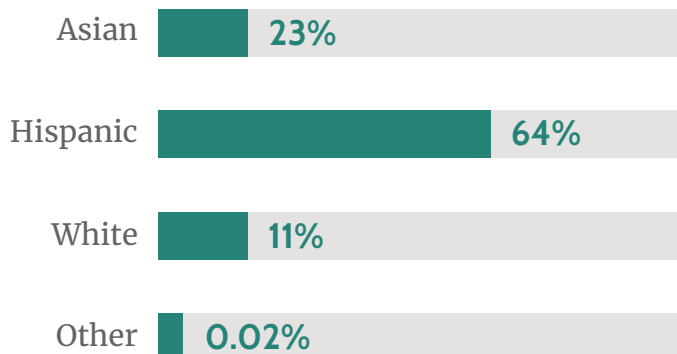

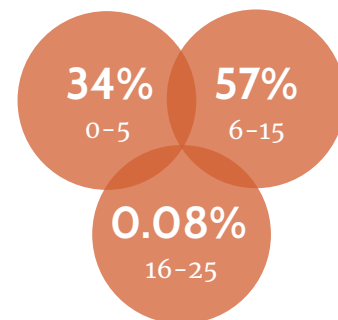

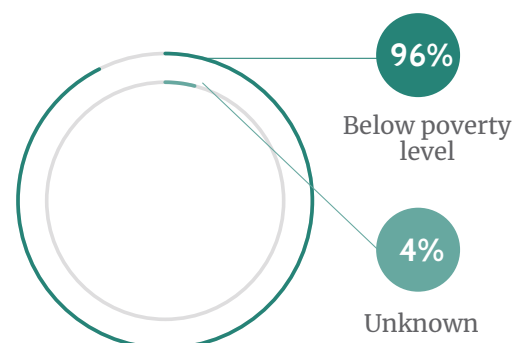

# TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM (THP)-PLUS PROGRAM

Our Transitional Housing Programs aim to reduce homelessness among current and former foster youth by providing access to safe, affordable, and supportive housing for youth transitioning out of the foster care system. The program provides job training, educational support, case management, and counseling. Our programs include Transitional Housing plus supportive services (THP-Plus), Transitional Housing, supportive services, plus foster care (THP+FC), and Supervised Independent Living (SILP).
